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# Groups praise Ontario for remaining firm — Doctors, Citizens Blast NAFTA over Pesticide Ban

OTTAWA, Nov. 6 / CNW Telbec / -- The Council of Canadians and the Canadian Physicians for the Environment (CAPE) today condemned NAFTA for letting chemical giant Dow sue Canada over a Quebec pesticide ban.

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" Citizens in every corner of the country are outraged that a U.S.-based transnational firm would attack Quebec's environmental laws, " says Council of Canadians board member and trade expert, Steven Shrybman.

CAPE Executive Director, Gideon Forman, says pesticide bans such as Quebec's reduce the use of lawn chemicals significantly and protect people from serious illness. "Exposure to somer of these poisons puts a person at risk for cancer and neurological disease, " says Forman. "But Quebec's ban helped cut pesticide use by 50% -- a far greater reduction than anywhere else in Canada."



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The **Council of Canadians** is calling on Ottawa to renegotiate **NAFTA** with the Obama Administration so the deal forbids companies from suing gov-

ernments. "The current NAFTA formulation is wholly unacceptable," says Shrybman. "It puts corporate profit ahead of human and environmental health."

Forman praised the Ontario Government — which is putting finishing touches on pesticide restrictions of its own — for not backing down. "There's huge pressure on Premier McGuinty to drop this prohibition on lawn pesticides. But to his credit, he's going ahead with a ban."

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On Monday, CAPE will be delivering to Parliament the first 10,000 petitions collected as part of its "Petition of Pesticides" campaign. The initiative calls for a ban on toxic lawn chemicals right across the country."

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#### Background Information from a Independent Perspective.

### Canadian Association of Physicians for the Environment (C.A.P.E.).

C.A.P.E. has mandated itself to educating health care professionals and the public in matters of *\*\* POLITICIZED SCIENCE\*\** and environmental public policy. Children's environmental health is reportedly its priority issue.



C.A.P.E. is potentially a <u>multi-million</u> <u>dollar</u> <u>money-making</u> <u>machine</u>.

C.A.P.E. currently has nearly **3000 members**. The cost of a C.A.P.E. membership is **one hundred dollars** per year. Its operating budget appears to be less than **1,000,000 dollars** per year with about a dozen employees.

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Coincidentally, C.A.P.E. has been provided with large sums of money by private and public funding organizations during the period of time covering the public debates on the Toronto prohibition and the Ontario prohibition (2001–2008). It is clear that the funds helped pay for infra-structures that were used to influence public policy concerning the Ontario \*\*Cosmetic Pesticides Ban Act\*\*

C.A.P.E. has been massively funded by **GOVERNMENT OF ONTARIO \*\* 55,000 dollars** for the period 2002–2003. **200,000 dollars** over a three-year period (beginning in 2006–2007) to strengthen C.A.P.E. operations across Ontario, and to increase its membership and long-term sustainability. In other words, the **GOVERNMENT OF ONTARIO** has been discretely supplying C.A.P.E. with the ammunition that it needed to conspire to prohibit pest control products.

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#### C.A.P.E. objectives.

Many environmental groups, like C.A.P.E., have been created for concealing the views of supposedly moderate professionals, such as physicians and health care workers in Ontario, in an attempt to mask their extremist views. This is evident since one of the co-founders of C.A.P.E. later became the first leader of \*\*Green Party of Canada\*\*.

C.A.P.E. has aspirations of becoming a *NATIONAL* organization. The issues surrounding pest control products have provided C.A.P.E. with an <u>unbelievable</u> opportunity establish itself outside of Ontario, to recruit <u>new</u> members, and to attract <u>more money</u> and <u>more power</u>. The leaders of C.A.P.E. want to expand their lucrative operation, ostensibly regardless of the cost to those industries that they conspire against. This may be deemed as the ultimate form of <u>greed</u> or <u>depraved indifference</u>.

The principal interests and agendas of the C.A.P.E. can be summarized in the two following categories. —

- One. The <u>acquisition</u> and <u>retention</u> of massive amounts of money from government grants, the private sector, and individual memberships. When given some power and money, many at C.A.P.E. have felt compelled to impose their personal life style choices on society. They may do so by mis-representing the existing facts, and hence gleefully avoiding « <u>sound science</u> » in order to promote their cause.
- <u>Two</u>. The <u>acquisition and retention</u> of <u>fame</u>, <u>celebrity</u>, <u>and power</u> by many at C.A.P.E. who are narrow-minded and little people who are laymen, and do not even have high education, or possess a degree of any kind. These layman feel compelled to make public appearances in <u>laboratory coats</u>. Some present themselves as medical doctors, or as experts in the <u>Green Space Industry</u>. Let's just say that some of them <u>HAVE ISSUES</u>.

There can be no doubt that C.A.P.E. has become a highly <u>profitable</u> <u>business</u> managed by very highly ambitious people. It is potentially becoming a <u>multi-million dollar money-making machine</u>. In addition, C.A.P.E. <u>does not pay taxes</u> because of its <u>charitable</u> or <u>non-profit status</u>. Moreover, many individual donations may be accepted <u>in cash</u> that may potentially become undisclosed revenue. C.A.P.E. is a business-person's dream-come-true.

#### City adds support to pesticide foes

Council motion backs group in fight against chemical firm's **NAFTA** challenge.

The city of Montreal has added its support to a group urging the federal government to resist a NAFTA challenge that aims to override provincial pesticide laws.

**Équiterre**, an environmental group, and 40 community organizations are up against Dow AgroSciences, a unit of the U.S. giant Dow Chemical. Dow AgroSciences makes a weed-killer called 2,4-D, which is banned in Quebec.





Since 2003, the province has had one of the toughest laws in North America limiting pesticide use. Also, the city of Montreal passed a bylaw in 2004 that bans the use of cosmetic pesticides.

In August, Dow AgroSciences filed a notice of intent against the Canadian government, contending the ban on 2,4-D violates the North American Free Trade Agreement. The notice is a first step before filing a formal claim to arbitration. The company estimates damages to be at least \$2 million.



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" Our notice of intent is meant to ensure important public policy decisions are based on scientific evidence, a clear set of principles and managed in a transparent framework, " said Brenda Harris, Dow Agro-Sciences regulatory and government affairs manager for Canada.

Dow asserts the ban prohibits a product that has not been proven unsafe.

**Équiterre** spokesperson **Edith Smeeters** disagrees.



"The research on (2,4-D) was done by the industry, and the data can be manipulated," said Smeeters, a biologist.



" Our research shows 2,4-D is a risk to the immune system, the reproductive system and the endocrine system. "

" Children sit on the lawn, they eat the grass. This pesticide is dangerous to their health. "

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Montreal city council adopted a resolution Feb. 23 in support of **Équiterre**.

If the federal government does not fight Dow on this matter, the results could have ramifications across the country, said Alan DeSousa, the Montreal executive committee member in charge of sustainable development.



When the town of Hudson proposed a bylaw banning pesticides in 1991, the case went to the Supreme Court of Canada. In 2001, the top court upheld the power of municipalities to restrict pesticide use in their communities.

" No one dies from walking on a lawn, but the effects 30 years down the line are what we are concerned about, " Smeesters said. " Health concerns must trump business. "

#### Équiterre, Suzuki's ambassador in Quebec.





On September 10<sup>th</sup>, 2008, *ÉQUITERRE* issued a press release with the following statements ...

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Fin de la vente de pesticides.
Équiterre se réjouit de la décision de Rona,
Canadian Tire, Home Depot et Loblaws.

The end of pesticide sales. « ÉQUITERRE » rejoiced at the decision of major consumer stores that ceased selling all types of pest control products. This was a project dear to the heart of David Suzuki. By the way, the national headquarters for Rona is in Quebec, and undoubtedly was pressured by both « ÉQUITERRE » and Suzuki.

- <u>«ÉQUITERRE»</u> is an affiliated member with the ultra-militant <u>«PESTI-CIDE ACTION NETWORK NORTH AMERICA»</u> (P.A.N.N.A.), along with <u>«CANADIAN ASSOCIATION OF PHYSICIANS FOR THE ENVIRONMENT»</u> (C.A.P.E.) and <u>«CANADIAN ENVIRONMENTAL LAW ASSOCIATION»</u> (C.E.L.A.).
- « ÉQUITERRE » operates a public affairs <u>shield</u> organization called « CANADIAN ALTERNATIVES TO PESTICIDES » (C.A.P.).

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#### Équiterre funding.

Like Suzuki, « Équiterre » is heavily funded by « McConnell Initiatives ».

"THE J. W. McConnell Family Foundation" is known for its work under the name "McConnell Initiatives".

#### THE J.W. MCCONNELL FAMILY FOUNDATION

In the period 2002-2006, through a structured capacity-building program, \*\*The J. W. McConnell Family Foundation\*\* assisted, to the tune of 1.47 million dollars, five environmental organizations, which included \*\*Equiterre\*\*, to improve their professionalism, diversify funding, enhance communications and develop effective programs to engage Canadians. One of the goals of the program was to contribute to the environmental sector's ability to \*\*Help\*\* Canadians understand and address environmental challenges. \*\*Sierra Club of Canada\*\* and \*\*Canadians Institute for Environmental Law and Policy\*\* (C.E.L.A.) participated as observers, but were likely remunerated for their time.

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In the period 2003–2006, through a structured capacity-building program, "THE J. W. McConnell Family Foundation" supported regional and national activities aimed at promoting individual action and community-level engagement, by linking "Politicized Science" to citizen action, engaging employers and employees, through active transportation and through activities designed to change behaviour linked to climate change. One of the goals was to augment the range of activities and accelerate the rate at which Canadians "ADOPT" sustainable choices. The total amount of the initiative was 930,000 dollars. There were eight grant beneficiaries, two of whom we know already.

"DAVID SUZUKI FOUNDATION" with its "NATURE CHALLENGE", an ongoing campaign to inform and engage citizens in making a personal commitment to changes in ten areas of their lives. "ÉQUITERRE" with is "LE DÉFI ÉQUITERRE", inspired by "NATURE CHALLENGE", which adapted and launched a web-based challenge to the citizens of Quebec in 2004.



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Following extensive consultation and scientific review using the most current scientific methods, the **Health Canada** Pest Management Regulatory Agency has determined that 2,4-D meets Canada's strict health and safety standards, and as such is acceptable for continued registration in Canada.

The decision on 2,4-D is consistent with that of regulators in other Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) countries, including the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA), New Zealand and countries of the European Union, as well as the World Health Organization (WHO).

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Health Canada is aware of public concern regarding domestic uses of pesticides on lawns and gardens (often referred to as "cosmetic" or aesthetic uses).

#### How does Health Canada's re-evaluation assessment compare with that of other countries?

Our review concurs with the findings of regulators in other OECD countries, including the European Union, New Zealand, and the Word Health Organization.

Pesticides are regulated by Health Canada under the Pest Control Products Act, and are among the most stringently regulated substances in Canada. The Pest Management Regulatory Agency (P.M.R.A.) is the branch of Health Canada that administers the Act on behalf of the Minister of Health. The primary objective of the P.M.R.A. is to prevent unacceptable risks to people and the environment from the use of pesticides.
